The International Conference of Decorative Painters, also known as the Salon, is an invitation-only gathering of dedicated decorative painters from around the world, who come together to exhibit their work and discuss techniques, products, and information. Members are decorative artists from respected schools or studios who have a background in

decorative painting and are highly respected amongst their peers.

The Salon enhances communication between members from different countries by offering an opportunity to follow demonstrations and lectures of famous decorative artisans. Overall, the Salon helps to promote interest in this ancient and unique craft. One of the ambitions of the Salon is to encourage gifted painters and craftsmen to aspire to the high level of integrity, commitment and discipline required by a craft that originated



before the Egyptians. Salon days are meant for decorators and teachers, as well as students to learn, participate, demonstrate and communicate freely. Sharing this wealth of information has given birth to many friendships and

strengthened ties with other artists from all over the world.

The history of the Salon dates back to the early 1990s when a modest international gathering took place in Kuurne, Belgium. It was initiated by Alfred Marrecau, a noted Grand Master, and was sponsored by the Belgium Independent Painters Society.

In March 1996, Yannick Guegan expanded the concept of an international gathering by inviting the leaders in the decorative world to visit his studio and school in Quimiac, France. This gathering was considered to be a complete celebration of decorative art. Alfred Marrecau, at 86 years old, attended the event, and, of course, was delighted to see his initiative on an even grander scale. Quimiac, Joris Arts and J.Berghuis Jr. continued the gathering and planned the following year. The Dutch Employers Union (FOSAG), hosted a gathering in Utrecht, The Netherlands. These professional gatherings became known as the Salon. The first

Day1:

Derby style hats were given to each participant as they arrived with instructions to adorn them with their own unique style of artistry.

The evening gathering was held at one of Belgium's oldest working breweries, Brouweru Taverne. A tour was given, samplings of the brewerey's finest ales were offered, medieval games were played and dinner was served

Days 2 & 3:

Demonstrations and lectures were scheduled throughout the SALON each day. The evenings of days 2 & 3, participants were free to tour the beautiful city by night.

Day 4.

Closing: Participants broke down their stations and then rushed to complete the derbies to wear and display at the closing night gala. An elegant Belgian church was the backdrop for the closing night ceremony. The manifest for the next SALON was given to Benny Carlsson of Oslo, Norway, A wonderful dinner and dance closed the event.
