

Cathy Conner, Inge Andres Visnes and Benny Carlsson specialized in painted floors and wood grained doors to set the scene for the display of faux materials.

Upon the arrival of the members, each country chose an area to represent their work, where Lucretia Moroni's exhibit of a Persian carpet held center stage. The Vigini Studio was reserved for private events and the Craft Center was the site of the public exhibition. Yannik Guegan, on this, his premier visit to the United States, worked at the Southwest School of Art and Craft and Benny Carlsson

Pierre Finkelstein held his audience spellbound with his demonstrations of trompe l'oeil ornamentation, as did Jean-Luc Sable, Michel Nadai and his wife Kyoko. They exhibited a range of works from perfect arabesque trompe l'oeil, to wood graining, to a lifelike
